MISSION

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul is a lay Catholic organization whose mission is:

 to live the Gospel message by serving Christ in the poor with love, respect, justice and joy.

VALUES

As Vincentians we:

- See Christ in anyone who suffers;
- Come together as a family;
- Have personal contact with the poor;
- Help in all possible ways.

WHO ARE THE POOR?

 People are poor when they are excluded from the ordinary living patterns, customs, and activities of society and face a constant struggle to live with dignity


POVERTY CAN BE

- Being unemployed / working poor
- Being lonely, bereaved, mentally ill
- Being disabled, depressed, unable to cope with day to day challenges
- Living with violence, drug addiction, alcoholism
- Being isolated (seniors, refugees)
- Having few options to choose

OUR LOGO

The logo has the following meaning:


- The fish is the symbol of Christianity and, in this case, represents the Society of Saint Vincent de Paul.
- The eye of the fish is the vigilant eye of God seeking to help the poor in our midst.
- The crossing at the tail or the tie-knot represents unity and oneness among members, as well as union with the poor.
- The circle bounding the logo signifies the global or worldwide stature of the SSVP, an international Society.
- The words "<u>serviens in spe</u>" mean to serve in hope, the hope that comes from Our Lord Jesus Christ.





OUR PATRON Saint Vincent de Paul

- 24 Apr 1581 27 Sept 1660
- French Catholic priest
- Dedicated to service of poor
- Renowned for compassion, humility, generosity
- Founder of Daughters of Charity
- Patron of all works of charity
- Canonized in 1737




HOW WE BEGAN Blessed Rosalie Rendu

- Sept 9 1786 Feb 7 1856
- Beatified Nov 9 2003
- Joined the Daughters of Charity at age 17
- Leading worker and organizer of care for the poor in Paris slums
- Directed students & influential citizens to support families in need of care
- Mentored Frederic Ozanam beginning in 1833
- Saw the poor as "our lords and masters"
 - *"One of the greatest ways of doing good to the poor is to show them respect and consideration"*




OUR FOUNDER Blessed Frederic Ozanam

- Born Apr 23 1813, died Sept 8, 1853
- Beatified August 22, 1997 by Pope John Paul II
- French literary scholar, lawyer, journalist, equal rights activist
- 1833 co-founded Conference of Charity to help the poor
- 1835 adopted title and rules of SSVP
- Insisted that charity be extended to non-Catholics & countries outside France
- Mentored by Sister Rosalie Rendu

National Council of Canada

Society Founded in Canada in 1846

Regional Council

5 in Canada (Quebec, Ontario, Atlantic, BC/Yukon, Western)

Central Council (normally comprised of 5 – 10 Particular Councils) St Michael Conference part of Calgary Diocesan Central Council

Particular Council (formed of Conferences in same vicinity) St Michael Conference belongs to West Particular Council

MEMBERSHIP

People join the Society to develop their faith & improve their Christian life

Classes of Membership:

- *Full member: Any person willing to serve the poor & participate in meetings and activities of the Society. Executive must be Roman Catholic*
- Auxiliary member: Any person, Catholic or not, who accepts the Society's principles. Auxiliary members may attend meetings, but do not vote and cannot run for executive office
- Benefactor: Persons recognized for their financial contributions or other support to the Society. Invited to attend general meetings.
- Youth Adult member: Full members b/w ages of 19 and 35
- Youth Member: Full members aged 12 to 19, working with an adult full member as a mentor

CONFERENCE

Term originated with the <u>Conference of Charity</u> (1833)

- Provides environment in which members develop & nurture common spiritual life & encounter Christ in the poor
- Main role is to group together people pursuing the Society's mission
 - Create an environment that enables members to develop a sense of Vincentian spirituality, friendship, & solidarity
 - Most important responsibility is to comfort & aid the poor
 - Fundamental activity is the person-to-person encounter with the poor through home visits carried out in pairs
 - Vincentians are <u>guests</u> of persons being visited, they are the hosts
 - Conference members should become defenders of social justice
 - Conference members work with others cannot do alone what needs to be done

Background: St Michael Conference

Established in 1994

Membership

- Executive 8 members
 - President, 1 Vice-President, Treasurer, Secretary, Banking Director, Advisors (2)
- Auxiliary members 2
 - Phone coordinator, Christmas Hamper Liaison
- Larder Manager & Food purchasers 2+
- Primary Home Visitors ~10
- Home Visitors ~ 10

KEY ACTIVITIES AND PROJECTS

Hamper delivery

• Food (including formula), household / hygiene supplies

Assistance with rent, utilities, transportation, meeting medical needs

• Furniture moving on [rare] occasions

Extended support (food/rent) in crisis situations

Parish food collection (now monthly); Christmas Share Sunday

Twinning

• Guatemala

KEY ACTIVITIES / PROJECTS

Christmas Hamper outreach

- Parish committee under auspices of SSVP
- A parish event!
- ~170+ hampers (30 for St Bernard Parish)

- Member of West Particular Council
- Member of Westside Interagency Committee
- Sonshine Home

Response to emerging issues/priorities

• RESP – (Canada Learning Bond)

EXPECTATIONS

Meetings:

- *Monthly, except December, July and August*
- Spiritual reflection (important aspect of meeting)

Home visitation:

- Primary and Home visitors
 - Response target 24 hours (except weekends)

Member Education:

- Orientation for new members
- Ad Hoc workshops as needed

SSVP Member Responsibilities

- Active participation in home visitations, Christmas Hamper program, and other activities as required (e.g., Our Lady Queen of Peace Christmas Party)
- Attendance at monthly meetings
- Adherence to the policies and procedures of the Society (knowing the Rule)
- Contributing to spirituality of members
- Responding to the need for involvement on committees when possible
- Successful completion of screening procedures
 - Security check
 - Volunteer information form, service/confidentiality agreement, Model Code of Conduct (Calgary Diocese)

Home Visitation

The fundamental underpinning of the Society Our Personal Encounter with the Poor

- Prayer before visits
- Visit in pairs always
- Demonstrate reverence, empathy, and gratitude
- Offer friendship, establish relationship
- Do not judge
- Love like Jesus
- Promote self-sufficiency
- Maintain confidentiality
- Follow up
- Prayer

SUMMARY

- We do home visits promptly
- We are characterized by a spirit of humility & cordiality
- Vincentian home visitors have certain abilities but are not visiting in a professional role
- Vincentians never judge Never!
